Swim BC is the Provincial Sport Organization and governing body for competitive swimming in British Columbia. Providing member services and sport governance to over 80 clubs and four university teams, competitive swimmers train in each region of the province. Collectively we have over 14,000 individual members (swimmers, coaches, club board members, and officials).

Message From The Executive Director

Dear members, friends, and supporters of Swim BC,

It is my great pleasure to (re-)introduce myself to you. My name is Elmar Heger, and I had the privilege of stepping into the role of Executive Director of Swim BC in June 2025. Since that time, I have been warmly welcomed by our Board of Directors, staff, clubs, coaches, officials, and volunteers across the province. I am deeply grateful for the commitment, passion, and energy that all of you bring to the sport of swimming in British Columbia, and it is both a great honour and a responsibility to lead this organization.

I am fortunate to join Swim BC at a time when the organization is grounded in strong governance, supported by a sound financial foundation, and driven by a community of members who care deeply about the future of our sport. Over the past several months, I have taken the time to listen, to learn, and to connect with many of you. Those conversations have been invaluable in helping me understand both the strengths we can build upon and the challenges we must address together. To ensure continuity in member services and operational support, we welcomed Jamie Dahlman into the organization as our new Membership and Administrative Coordinator. Most recently, we were thrilled to add Savannah King to the team as our Director of Coach and Performance Development. This technical leadership role is vital to our ability to support athletes, coaches, and clubs. Having Savannah with us at our Victoria office represents an important milestone for Swim BCcontinued focus on excellence at every stage of the performance pathway.

Of course, not everything over the past year has been easy. One of the most pressing issues our community faced during the 2024–25 season was the difficulty caused by the REMS system. These challenges placed a heavy burden on clubs, volunteers, and staff alike, and I want to extend my sincere thanks to everyone who worked so diligently and patiently through this difficult period. While the current 2025–26 registration cycle has still some complications, it has not been to the same extent as the previous year. Swim BC continues to work closely with Swimming Canada, our fellow provincial sport organizations, and the contracted IT specialists to ensure that the system becomes more reliable and user-friendly. These collaborative efforts are ongoing, and I remain optimistic that meaningful improvements will continue to take shape.

Looking forward, my vision for Swim BC is grounded in the belief that our province has both the capacity and the responsibility to be a strong leader in Canadian swimming. The increase in self generated revenue as compared to 2024 is due to the increase in the number of participants. Grants include an additional grant from Via Sport combined with 2 sponsorships in 2025 versus 1 in 2024.

Expenses increased due to payment to Sports Law for draft policies, an additional insurance policy for abuse, more expenditures on staff travel, BC Swimming Congress and one discipline case.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

The 2024-25 season proved to be a busy HR one for the group, in our support of the Executive Director and related staff. The office experienced significant staff turnover in late 2024; however, all positions have now been filled. With the retirement notice received from our past Executive Director in December 2024, we led the planning for the recruitment and selection of a new Executive Director with a target start date of May 2025.

ACTION ITEMS:

The HR committee met formally every 3-4 months but also held many ad hoc meetings for time-sensitive issues relevant to the recruitment of a new Executive Director. We are pleased to announce that the position was filled by Elmar Heger in June 2025 and a successful transition has occurred from the outgoing ED to Elmar.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The HR committee will continue to readily support the Executive Director with further strategies to retain and develop our existing staff, aligning with the Swim BC Strategic Plan.

We are committed to reviewing all relevant HR policies on a scheduled basis or prioritizing those that are deemed urgent. There is an established review and approval process in place, however, the committee welcomes any feedback from the members.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

The Safe Sport Committee is a standing committee of the Swim BC Board, approved by the Board in January, 2023. The committee was struck both as a response and sensitivity to the growing importance of the evolving need to focus on culture change in our sporting environment, and as a response to our insurance providers requirements. The Safe Sport Committee held two meetings. The committee discussed unfinished business from the previous meetings, including open water swimming, and addressed new business such as the new Sport Safeguarding BC initiative, the updated Swim Canada Police Record Check policy, and a review of the committee's Terms of Reference (TOR).

ACTION ITEMS:

The Safe Sport Committee is focused on several key action items to improve the organization's framework. The committee chair is currently working to finalize the Terms of Reference (TOR), which includes clarifying the role of the "Club President" representative with the Swim BC Board of Directors, along with adding a "High Performance Athlete", as a new addition to the committee. This effort will also involve updating the TOR's language regarding meeting frequency, the ability to call ad hoc meetings, and the term schedules for all committee members. In addition, the committee is proactively exploring Swim BC's role in supporting open water swimming. This includes the Executive Director engaging in discussions with external parties like insurance brokers and Triathlon BC to evaluate potential partnerships. The goal of these collaborations is to share resources and infrastructure, while simultaneously developing new sanctioning criteria to ensure a high level of safety for all participants.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The committee recommends several changes to enhance safety protocols. It is proposed that Swim BC adopt the term "Sport Safety" to reflect a more comprehensive approach to a safe environment. Additionally, a new policy was approved to align with Swim Canada's three-year police record check cycle, and member clubs are encouraged to publicly post their Discipline and Complaints and Appeals policies for greater transparency. The committee also received an update on the new Sport Safeguarding BC initiative, which will provide an independent service for resolving complaints of maltreatment.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

The 2024-2025 season continued to build on the policy review and structure provided to Swim BC by an external contractor in the 2021-2022 season. As each policy is reviewed and approved, all are made available to the member clubs as an opportunity for club adoption and to reduce policy development burden at the club level.

The policy committee met every 1-3 months to review the documents relevant to the operations of Swim BC and its members. Policies approved this year include:

- · Board Policy
- · Discipline and Complaints Policy
- Club Policy
- · Risk Management Policy
- · Appeal Policy
- Sanction Policy
- · Gender Equity Policy
- Financial Management Policy

Many of the policies noted above were review and approval of existing policies with minor or no amendments. The Sanction Policy is new to the organization to formalize existing practices. The Financial Management Policy is new to the organization and was prepared and endorsed by the Finance Committee.

RECOMMENDATIONS: The policy committee is committed to reviewing all policies on a scheduled basis, or to prioritize those that are deemed urgent. There is an established review and approval process in place and, as always, the committee welcomes any feedback from the members.

ACTION ITEMS: In the coming year the committee will be undertaking a Bylaw review to ensure that Swim BC's Bylaws remain up to date and in compliance with best practices for sports and/or non-profit organizations.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

- 1. The committee met several times during the reporting period. Specifically, the following elements received attention from the Committee.
- 2. Frequency and schedule were set up to occur on a more regular occurrence.
- 3. One director position remained unfilled in October 2024 after the AGM. Gareth Saunders filled this position in May 2025.
- 4.Increased communication took place between our committee and the Communications Coordinator. A concerted effort was made to showcase our activities on social media.
- 5. Discussion continued regarding the challenges we were finding to recruit new interested individuals in director positions, although interest seems to have increased.
- 6.A discussion of establishing a long-term vision for receiving more yearly director nominations at the AGM was initiated.

ACTION ITEMS:

- 1. Discussion continued to take place regarding the ongoing difficult task of recruiting interested parties for the vacant positions.
 - o Try to achieve regional representation.
 - o Consider targeting those with a specific skill set.
 - o Individuals with experience in/passion for youth/competitive sport.
 - o Reach out to multiple associations (e.g. ViaSport) and community paid advertising
 - o Utilizing social LinkedIn to advertise the vacant positions and the roles of the directors.
- 2. Review, edit and circulate terms of reference for the Nominations Committee

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Continue to liaise with the Communications Coordinator to recruit for Board of Directors. Develop a long-term vision for recruiting for the Board of Directors to avoid having unfilled positions.

Safe Sport

Swim BC is committed to fostering a safe, inclusive, and respectful environment for all participants. At the heart of this commitment is promoting a positive culture, ethical behaviour, and values-based participation across all levels of the sport. Our Safe Sport initiatives create spaces where athletes, coaches, officials, and volunteers can thrive, feel supported, and fully engage in swimming programs.

Complaints are not merely procedural matters; they are opportunities to strengthen this positive culture. By addressing concerns thoughtfully and promptly, Swim BC reinforces trust, promotes transparency, and fosters an environment where all members feel valued and supported. Providing accessible and trusted avenues for raising concerns is a key aspect of Safe Sport. During the 2024/2025 season, a total of five (5) cases were accepted. In some instances, the complexity of cases required additional reviews, consultation, and coordination with Independent Third Parties. Insights gained from these experiences continue to inform Swim BC's policies, procedures, and educational initiatives.

Beyond complaint management, our Safe Sport work includes promoting ethical values, safeguarding practices across all programming, and collaborating with partner organizations to provide guidance, resources, and training. By embedding these initiatives into everyday operations, Swim BC strives to ensure that swimming in British Columbia remains welcoming, inclusive, and free from maltreatment, enabling every participant to reach their full potential.






